Manhattan College Students CREATE Innovations for Lifespire, Products Plus

For the second consecutive year, senior year students at Manhattan College, under the auspices of the CREATE program of the NYSID, will partner with Lifespire to design and enhance systems that will help improve the productivity and cost-efficiency of our affirmative business operations.

Last year, the students developed a prototype 25-compartment shelving unit, called BrightLife, that uses LED lighting and RFID reader scans to improve the accuracy and workflow of individuals who package and ship clothing items for the New York City Housing Authority (NYCHA) at Lifespire's Manhattan North facility.


This year's students will investigate possible improvements to the BrightLife prototype, including a more intuitive user interface design, networking multiple units together to handle multiple orders, and a less costly alternative to the RFID reader. Lifespire is thinking of incorporating BrightLife into the future redesign of the Bronx warehouse facility. Here is a link to a video of the project: http://youtu.be/Og8pV51HUTs

In addition, a separate group of Manhattan College students are working on a project with our Products Plus business to largely automate the process of diluting concentrated chemical cleaning agents to produce products such as window cleaner, sanitizer, carpet cleaner, and deodorizer that are sold to Lifespire and other nonprofit agencies.

Called the Optimal Chemical Dispenser, this multi-chamber system will allow individuals to select, input, and dispense the appropriate amounts of chemicals, with an external data logger to record dispensary usage. The Optimal Chemical Dispenser will house multiple chemicals, accurately measure and record data, provide additional safety features, and improve the user-friendliness of the current equipment at a fraction of the manufacturer's cost to do so.

"These students are very creative," says Nelson Delerme, who is overseeing the project for Products Plus. "The Optimal Chemical Dispenser should improve the speed, quality, and cost-efficiency of our current chemical dispensing system and increase the number of individuals who can work on the system at one time. In addition, it will save Products Plus about \$30,000-\$40,000 in new equipment costs as the students will design and program the entire system."

The project is slated for completion in May, 2015.



Sam Tocker CSC Holds First Annual Fashion & Hair Expo

The event was inspired by individual Jessica who found that combing and braiding a wig on a mannequin head to have a very calming effect. She enjoyed this activity so much that she began combing the hair of her peers, as well.

Alana Maughn, Day Habilitation Aide III, was so proud of Jessica's progress, as well as the talent of other Day Hab individuals, that she suggested the idea of holding a Fashion & Hair Expo.

The purpose of the event was to allow individuals to express their own identity through fashion, build self-esteem, practice team work, boost their confidence, and live out their dreams of walking the runway.

Individuals picked the fashion style they wished to model, with choices that included casual, dressy, sporty, 60s, 70s, and 80s. The staff prepared dressing rooms where individuals got their hair and make-up done, although several individuals did their own make-up and design. Wigs were styled, accessories were brought in, and the red carpet was laid down.

The Expo was a truly collaborative effort among the staff, the individuals, their parents, and other Lifespire facilities. Each individual received a certificate for participating, and there was a prize raffle for parents who attended the event.

The highlight of the Expo was individual Vanessa Faulk and her mother, who walked the runway together for the dressy category.

Advocacy Day - Lifespire Speaks with Local Legislators on Program Funding Cuts

On Advocacy Day, February 27, Lifespire and several other agencies were given the opportunity to speak with local lawmakers about proposed cuts to government funding for vital programs that help those with developmental disabilities.

Mark Najamy, Assistant Facility Director of Manhattan North CSC, led a group of Lifespire individuals, family members, and professionals to meet with Gabriel Hernandez, the assistant to State Assemblyman Robert J. Rodriguez, and with Eric Riviera, the assistant to New York State Senator Jose Serrano. The group discussed proposed cuts to funding that would affect Lifespire's prevocational services, as well as the need for more vocational training programs and other day services for those with developmental disabilities.

"Our team was fantastic," says Mark. "We had three parents, two self-advocate individuals, and two professionals. Having the parents was extremely helpful as they spoke very passionately on how these programs have made a difference in their children's lives. They also voiced the concern that their children's mental stability will worsen if these services are no longer available, and wondered where their children would go for this kind of assistance."

Individuals Monique Williams and Vance Kershaw, who receive prevocational services, were also part of Lifespire's Advocacy Day team. "I'm especially proud of Monique and Vance. They spoke from the heart about their own experiences and their fear of what would happen to them if these programs were cut. They really let their voices be heard."

Mark was impressed by how many different agencies participated in the Advocacy Day event. "There were a lot of professionals and a

surprising number of family members, too. In fact, it felt like we were all one big family that day."

Mark felt that their meetings were productive and that they made their points in a clear and organized way. "Mr. Hernandez and Mr. Rivera were very receptive to our concerns and generously allowed us plenty of time to explain them," says Mark. "They were both high engaged in the conversation, were attentive to the issues we presented, and assured us that these concerns were going to be passed on to the legislators. I'm glad that Lifespire was able to play a part in the Advocacy Day activities."
